# ANONYMOUS AUTHOR ABOUT HIS PATRON – EDWARD IV

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
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#### Introduction

When reconstructing the author's ideas about the events he describes, the methods of historical anthropology, approaches to the study of mentality are used.




### Relevance

Also, the Anonymous author is often adding epithets such as the "the most noble," "true," never losing a chance (with every convenient case) to mention the "true" origin of King Edward IV. Especially, the Anonymous author is enthusiastic about the courage and persistence with which the king overcame all the difficulties; and it says more than "any great torments." Edward's companions are referred to as "true servants," who advocated for him with "great joy." Also, the author emphasizes the exceptional merit of the king in the organization of troops, victory in the final battle and his "mercy" and "generosity" in his attitude to the rebels.



This position of the author of the Chronicles is explained by the fact that he is a supporter of the Yorks, "the servant of the king, who saw most of his feats."

Having analyzed the style of the presentation, it can be assumed that the author was a cleric, explaining the victory and all the actions of the King Eduard IV as God's will.
